**Minutes:** Recording Secretary Neal O'Briant asked if anyone had changes to the minutes from May as posted in the newsletter. Minutes were approved.

President's Report: Jo Ellen thanked outgoing officers for their service: treasurer Lauren Brockman and vice president Susan Luster. She welcomed new board members: treasurer Elise Stiles and vice president Jimmy Sodano. She announced that Susan had agreed to be an advisory member to the board this year. Jo Ellen asked for anyone who was a tax attorney or CPA or was related to one to let her know. Library Report: Jo Ellen presented information librarian Christina Sydor had emailed her. Christina hopes to complete the project of adding the books from Audrey's library this month. Bill Schmitz copied new videos to be added to the library, and Christina will bring them sometime in

Corresponding Secretary's Report: Joanne Wood asked for any members who had not received the newsletter to let her know.

Charlene Poissel volunteered to bring refreshments in October. Urban Ministries: Anne Terry said that the committee had been gathering bowls for the November Stone Soup Supper, Gail Lawson volunteered that she could add a running tally to the website. Workshop Committee: Jimmy Sodano announced that Ben Owen III will present the spring TPG workshop on February 3-4. The Friday night event will be open to all members and will be lieu of the regular meeting that month. Ben will show slides and begin throwing at the Friday night event. The Saturday workshop will feature more throwing and glaze information. The proposed cost for the workshop will be \$60 for members, \$35 for NSCU students, and \$80 for the general public. Registration will open to members and NCSU students on November 1. The public will be able to register December 1 if any spaces remain. New Business: Joanne Wood shared an invitation for the guild to participate in Heritage Day at Historic Oak View County Park on October 1. Vice President's Report: Jimmy Sodano reported that he had worked on scheduling the speakers for the coming year based on members' input to his questionnaire in May. October's speaker will be Travis Owens of Jugtown on the history of North Carolina pottery. Other presenters at future meetings include David Fernandez and Julia Fisher. Jimmy introduced the speaker, Daniel Johnston of Seagrove. Program: Daniel Johnston introduced his partner, Kate Waltman, and his apprentice. John Vigeland. Daniel showed slides of his experiences as an apprentice to Mark Hewitt and to Clive Bowen in North Devon, England, The slides also covered his extended trip to Phon Bok, Thailand, and pictures of his pots and studio in Seagrove. Daniel showed a DVD of his 100 pot project before demonstrating how to make large pots with coils on a Thai wheel.

#### **GLOSSARY**

ABSORPTION The ability of a fired clay to absorb water. Used as a gauge

of vitrification AIR-FLOATED; AIR-FLOATING

Industrial method used in processing of raw clays, where powdered clay is floated in an airstream to settle out heavier particles.

**BALL CLAY AI203-2SiO2-2H2OO**—

Deposited in marshy areas. Very fine particle size, high plasticity, high drying shrinkage, high in organic

contaminates. Fires white or off white. **BASALT BODY; BASALT WARE** 

Clay body with sufficient amounts of dark clays and/or metallic oxides to fire dark brown or black.

#### BENTONITE Al203-5SiO2-H2O

montmorillonitic clay formed from decomposition of airborne volcanic ash-finest particle size of all claysplasticizer (three times as powerful as ball clay), suspension agent, should be used in quantities of no more than 3% of dry materials weight.

**BONE CHINA** Translucent porcelain containing bone ash.

**CARBONDALE CLAY** Refractory red stoneware clay, used to obtain rich red and brown colors in high-fire clay bodies. **CLAY** Widely occurring aluminum silicate mineral resulting from natural decomposition of feldspar and granite. Composed of microscopic disk-shaped platelets that give clay its slippery. plastic quality.

CLAY BODY Clay mixture formulated of clays and other ceramic raw materials to give desired working characteristics.

**DEAIRING** The process of removing the air from a plastic clay mass, usually accomplished through wedging, or far more effectively with a vacuum deairing pugmill. (go to www.ceramicartsdaily.org for more info on how to become a member.)
