October Program Presenter: Julie Olson

Julie Olson has been making pottery for 36 years, having begun at college in Washington State as an art major focusing on design, printmaking and pottery. This background is evident in her body of work, particularly her shrine series, which reflects a profound thoughtfulness, superb craftsmanship and spiritual content.

However, with the building of her new kiln, Julie explores and asks the question: how do I make a living at clay in this economy? The new kiln, named Ruby for "recycled used brick y'all" is an important part of her process. Made of recycled material, Julie returns to the '70s with a new focus on functional ware in rich, warm, earthy tones. It goes back to trying to survive as a potter. Julie is hopeful that the new line of functional stoneware pots will be more marketable and saleable than her sculptural, esoteric pieces as well as more economical to produce. The large new kiln is fired to cone 10 with propane.



I met Julie at a class at the Craft Center and I was immediately impressed by her warm, approachable, down to earth teaching style. As a craftsman, her impeccable attention to detail translates to an ability to convey not only the form but the specific function which animates her work. I'm looking forward to seeing what she's been up to since last spring. She will be bringing slides of the new kiln and speaking about her process and new work at the TPG October meeting.

Meeting Minutes, September 4, 2012

Elise Stiles opened the new Triangle Potters' Guild year by welcoming all returning members and inviting five new members to introduce themselves.

The minutes of the May meeting were accepted.

Librarian Edge Barnes reported a total of 65 to 75 donated books. He asked for every library book to be returned for inventory up to the time of the next meeting. Books will not be available for checkout for a week before to a week after October's meeting. He also announced a new and more efficient method for checking books out.

Corresponding Secretary Neal O'Briant announced programs set up for Garth Clark at the Mint Museum in Charlotte and at the Gregg Museum at NC State and promised more information by e-mail.

Treasurer Martin Stankus announced the sum of \$5334 to be in the Guild's bank account, with membership fees for the new Guild year still accruing. He said that the total sales at Artsplosure amounted to \$15,531.

Member Katie Johnson offered to provide refreshments for the October meeting.

Lauren Brockman announced that plans for participation in this year's State Fair were, of necessity, already in place but that members might consider inclusion in next year's Fair.

Emily Malpass and Anne Terry asked for good bowls, possibly accompanied by labels, to be donated for the Urban Ministries' Empty Bowls project and told members a little about the annual event. Both bowls and volunteers are needed for the annual Stone Soup fund raiser.

Donna Kanich, Chair of the Workshop Committee, suggested that after several years of throwing workshops the next one should be by a hand builder. Katherine Thornton's name was suggested and members were asked for additional recommendations.

Past President Jo Ellen Westmoreland, coordinator of events and classes at the Crafts Center, passed a ceremonial gavel to Elise Stiles.

She invited members to sign up for the Crafts' Center Craft Fair to be held on November 17. The charge for a booth is \$100.

Jimmy Sodano, in delivering his Vice President's report announced his resignation: he is now both attending graduate school and preparing for fatherhood. He has already made most of the preparations for the new season's program. Elise invited members to consider volunteering for the vacant post.

The September program consisted of a spirited demonstration by Linda Goodwin of her lidded functional pieces ornamented by frogs and lily pads.

Sales Tax Notice

The N.C. Department of Revenue's Sales and Use Tax Division has added Form E-505 at http://www.dornc.com/downloads/e505_9-12.pdf (Legislative Changes to Sales and Use Tax). This form includes changes enacted by the 2012 Session of the General Assembly to the taxes administered by the division. One important point is that sales tax must be stated and charged separately on written receipts or the retailer must display a statement indicating the sales price includes the tax.

Garth Clark Visits NC to Discuss the Future of Traditional Pottery

Garth Clark is considered by many to be one of the great contemporary critics and writers in the field of ceramics. South African by birth, he has lived in the U.S. since the mid 1970s. He ran galleries in LA and NYC with his partner Mark del Vecchio for 30 years. He has been a prolific writer and advocate of ceramics in all its forms, and has lectured all over the world. This affords the state of N.C. and its potters a unique opportunity to exchange ideas with one of our field's brightest thinkers.

- October 16 in Charlotte (10 a.m.-3 p.m.): Garth will deliver the keynote lecture in a symposium called "Traditional Pottery: Back to the Future," presented by the Delhom Service League at the Mint Museum's Randolph Road location. After Garth's lecture there will be ample time for audience participation. The keynote address will be preceded by shorter presentations by Matt Jones, Mark Hewitt and Charlotte Brown Wainwright. - October 18 in Raleigh (6–8 p.m.): Garth will deliver a lecture on the subject of traditional pottery, its present and future, and host questions from the audience. Event will be held at the Gregg Museum at N.C. State University, 2610 Cates Ave., 2nd floor Talley Student Center.
- October 20 in Asheville (2–4 p.m.): Garth will participate in a panel discussion moderated by Andrew Glasgow. Other panelists will include Mark del Vecchio (writer and gallerist), Mark Hewitt (potter), and Jean McLaughlin (executive director of the Penland School of Craft). The event will be hosted by UNCA and the Center for Craft Creativity and Design and held on the campus of UNCA. Exact location TBA.
