TPG Holiday Potluck Raku Party

For: Triangle Potters Guild members only and guests

Date: Saturday, December 7, 2013

Location: Conrad Weiser's, 3538 Hamstead Ct., Durham, NC 27707

Time: 10 am (start firing), 4 pm (eat), 5 pm (cut kiln off)

What to bring: No more than 3 bisqued pots and any favorite commercial glazes. Conrad will have glazes there, too. Wear long sleeves and pants, no open shoes, and hair tied back. Glögg will be provided as usual by Conrad, using Brita Tate's recipe as related (with some differing details) by her daughters. Directions: *From Raleigh and Chapel Hill:* Take I-40 to the Jordan Lake exit (Hwy. 751 or Hope Valley Road). Turn right (or left), drive north, approx. 3.5 miles (passing a lot of streets with names evoking British places and the golf course on both sides of Hope Valley Road), looking for Brighton Road on the right. Turn, go one block, then turn right onto Hamstead Court. Conrad's house is at the top of the second hill—on the right. (Look for a double mailbox with a teapot hanging underneath.) *From Durham:* Drive south on Hope Valley Road (Hwy. 751), cross Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd., past Reynolds, and look for Brighton Road on the left. Go left onto Brighton for one block and there is Hamstead Court. Conrad's house is at the top of the second hill on the right. Please park on the shoulders of the street, since the driveway will be filled with potters. Conrad's phone number is 919-490-1985 if you need to call.

Emily Malpass clarified some Empty Bowls questions and made arrangements to pick up the many pots that had been collected during the evening. The number turned out to be a very gratifying 175! And more are still being donated. A sign up sheet for volunteers to help with the event was circulated. Members who donated five or more bowls were invited to enter for the drawing of a gift certificate from Highwater Clay. The drawing will take place during the January meeting.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT: Edge announced that the library was up and running. Modifications will be effected in the near future.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT: Susanne invited interim reports and entries in addition to items for the monthly newsletter.

NEW BUSINESS

ACTION:

THE BOARD TODAY APPROVED A NEW POLICY AND DIRECTIVE ABOUT DUES. Note that there is no change to the Constitution and Bylaws rule that the newsletter be sent to paid-up members only.

CLARIFICATION OF DUES POLICY WITH REGARD TO TPG EVENTS:

1. All members who have paid their dues by the November meeting will be included in a priority list for participation in all Guild events.
2. Members who pay after the November dues deadline, including new members, will be eligible to participate fully in all events with their priority based on the date of dues payment.
3. In the event of more individuals desiring to participate in an event than there are available spaces, there will be a lottery of those paying before the deadline. Any spots not filled by the pre-deadline list will be filled on a basis of date paid, regardless of whether the member is a returning or new member.
